

Results from Be Medicinewise Week 2019 YouGov Galaxy survey

These are the results from a YouGov Galaxy poll of 1037 adults conducted in July 2019 for NPS MedicineWise, with 527 respondents regularly taking 2 or more medicines.

Recording medicines

Of the people surveyed who regularly take 2 or more medicines (527 respondents):

- Only **31%** actually keep a list of ALL of their prescription, over-the-counter and complementary medicines
- **26%** only keep a list of their prescription medicines
- 3% keep a list of some of their prescription, over-the-counter and complementary medicines
- 40% don't keep a list of any of the medicines they are taking.

People who do keep a list of their medicines record a lot of important information but still miss some important points, particularly around active ingredients:

- Of the people who regularly take two or more medicines **and** do keep a list of some or all of their medicines (316 respondents), only one in five (**22%**) said they record the active ingredient of the medicine. 17% said they record the date the medicine was started.
- Of these people, **48%** record the brand name, **63%** record information on the dose and how and when to take the medicine, **52%** record the reason for taking the medicine.

Asking questions about medicine

When reflecting on the last time they discussed a newly prescribed medicine with a doctor or pharmacist, people asked a lot of important questions, but still missed some important points. This question was asked of all survey respondents (1037 people).

- Only **16%** discussed what the active ingredient of the medicine is.
- 50% discussed how much medicine they need to take each time
- 56% discussed when to take the medicine
- 48% discussed how long to take the medicine
- 54% asked about possible side effects
- **43%** asked if it was safe to take with other medicines they take
- 30% asked if there was a cheaper brand of the medicine available
- 26% of people asked about the cost.

Non-English speaking backgrounds

Around **10%** of Australians have household or family members that have trouble getting information about their medicines because English is not their first language.
